2020 FESTIVAL HIGHLIGHTS

- * Our 2020 Festival was converted to a mainly online event due to COVID 19
- * Over 10 days, 11 online talks attracted 455 'Zoom' sessions
- * Sadly, the restrictions of COVID 19 meant the usual 'hands-on' activities were not possible this year
- However a novel 'Citizen Science' project on Gull Behaviour went ahead and was featured on the local and national TV news.
- * A programme of science related activities was also run for local primary schools
- * This included, over 1000 pieces of primary school art work on the theme of 'Footprints', displayed in Kennaway House, Sidmouth
- * The associated children's book 'Footprints' was read at several primary schools by the author, Jo Earlam
- * Two 'at home' science activities were offered build and race a rubber band car, and build a fantasy Jurassic Park model
- * Bug hunting and kick sampling results of primary schools children's experiments will be recorded as a part of the Sidmouth Biodiversity Project

Here is some of the feedback from our online survey


- * An expert and a great communicator. An informative, passionate and entertaining presentation



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
